Your new find appears to be the reverse side of a **Lion Daalder** (dollar) from the eastern Dutch Province of Gelderland, probably via colonial New Netherlands (later New York after the British won the 2nd Anglo-Dutch War, 1664). Such coins may have been traded far into the interior of America by Native Americans from the Algonkian/Iroquoian fur trade with the Dutch, and worn as an adornment (notice the hole at the tip of the lion's right paw of the 1640 Daalder). The same Lion Rampant also appears on the coat of arms of Gelderland (<a href="http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Gelderland">http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Gelderland</a>). Compare your coin to the 1648 Lion Daalder, below:
